Collective Worship - Talent Takes Practice

The term talent means something that you are naturally good at. Everybody has a talent. Some of you may know what it is, and some are yet to find out. Some of us are naturally good at maths or reading, some of us are good at thinking through problems, some of us are good listeners and some of us (like teachers) are good talkers. Caring and being kind is a talent, some of us are better at it than others.

In the video, the master gave the servants some money and they were expected to go and make more. They would ultimately benefit from their work. Two of the servants did just that, they invested the money and made it grow. The master was pleased with their work and rewarded them with the money. The last servant hid the money and carried on with his life, when the master came back, he was angry and took the money off of the servant.

Although the parable does talk about money, it also makes us think about what we do with the things we have been given. Not just material things but also our talents. In the famous parable about the sower and the seed, some seeds fell on the path and were quickly eaten by the birds. 21st-century talents, those natural abilities that we have will disappear if we don't use them. Talents may be defined as things that we are naturally good at, but unless we practise using them no one benefits from them.

Practising something over and over again, is the only way we will really get good or very good at something. Sometimes it is the things that we are good at that we never practise, because we are naturally good at them already. Imagine how good you could be at something you are naturally good at if you practised getting better at it.

Think about the following questions:


- What are you naturally good at?
