### <u>Time for prayer and reflection</u>

Talents include listening, caring and speaking. It is not just a footballer that benefits from his talent, but the spectators at the game. Finding a person who will listen when times are tough can be vitally important. A talent isn't just for the person who is able to use it, but it enhances the life of the people around them as well. In the Bible, St. Paul imagines the people who make up the church to be like a body. He said that just as a body is made up of different parts, so a community is made of different people with different talents. *St. Paul wrote "If the foot were to say, "Because I am not a hand, I don't belong to the body," that would not keep it from being a part of the body. And if the ear were to say, "Because I am not an eye, I don't belong to the body," that would not keep it from being a part of the body were just an eye, how could it hear? And if it were only an ear, how could it smell? As it is, however, God put every different part in the body just as he wanted it to be. There would not be a body if it were all only one part! (1 Corinthians 12:14-19 NIV) A community needs the variety of talents like a body needs its various parts.*




