WHO IS KAMALA HARRIS?

3orn on the 20th October, 1964 in Oakland, California, Kamala was the first child of Shyamala Gopalan – a breast nomics, who emigrated from British Jamaica in 1961. Along with her younger sister, she lived in West Berkeley but after her parents divorced when she was seven, she moved with her mother and sister to Montreal, Canada, where cancer scientist, who emigrated from India in 1960 – and Donald J. rom a young age, Harris resolved to spend her life advocating for those who could not defend themselves and he has been able to do this throughout her career in a variety of ways.

- She held corporations to account and protected the state's most vulnerable people;
- . She won a \$25 billion settlement for California homeowners who had been hit by the foreclosure crisis;
- · She defended California's landmark climate change law;
- · She protected the Affordable Care Act;
- · She helped win marriage equality for all Californians;
- And she prosecuted transnational gangs that trafficked guns, drugs and human beings.

criminal justice system; introducing legislation to raise wages for working people; making healthcare a right for She is a clear supporter of the rights of all communities in California and since taking office in the Senate she has continued to fight for justice. A few of the many things she has been involved with include reforming the all Americans; supporting veterans and military families; addressing the epidemic of substance abuse; and expanding access to childcare for working parents.

Harris for Vice President!

nitially, Harris had announced she was running for the Democratic presidential nomination in 2020; however, a lack of funds forced her to withdraw. On 12th June 2020, The New York Times reported that Harris was emerging as a frontrunner to be Biden's running mate. This came as a slight surprise given the contentious exchange she had had with Joe Biden over his opposition to school busing in the 1970s and 1980s and other race-re-

Yet Kamala Harris was ideal for the position. In fact, it has been claimed that no other candidate matched the political moment better than Harris, making her the obvious choice for Biden. She is a powerful debater, has qualifications for governing and her African-American, Asian-American heritage is hoped to bring some much needed racial diversity to American politics. On 11th August, 2020, she was announced as Biden's running mate
