Don't Worry, Be Happy!

Challenge – Can you summarise the Parable of the Rich Fool in 10 words?

Once upon a time, there was a young squirrel. The squirrel would watch its mum and dad collect acorns and bury them in the ground. When he asked them why they did this, they told him that the winters were long and that they needed to make sure that they had enough food to see them through the cold season. The young squirrel started to worry, what if we don't collect enough food? Or what happens if the winter is longer than normal? The young squirrel began by helping his mum and dad to collect and bury extra food, but before long the squirrel found himself not sleeping, all he could think about was collecting enough food. He would hunt for acorns in the dark while everyone else was sound asleep. He would even sneak off and bury some of the acorns that his mum prepared for him to eat. After telling the parable of the young fool, Jesus explained to his followers that God would look after those who did God's will. Jesus said, "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to your life?" (Luke 12:26 NIV). Being prepared for the future is very different than worrying about the future. The young squirrel's mum and dad prepared as they always did, but the young squirrel let worry rob him of his sleep and his happiness.

Reflection - Does worry make people feel better or worse? What advice would you have given the young squirrel?

We have learned that worrying cannot help solve any situation that we find ourselves in. Let us be grateful and content with what we have. We ask for support for those that don't have all their needs met, and we reflect on what we can do to help others.

Today, I would like you to complete a final edit of your metaphor poems based on 'I am a writer' and then publish them.

When editing, check:

- ~ spelling
- ~ you have used expanded noun phrases
- ~ you have used metaphors
- ~ you only reveal the object at the end



Then read your poem out loud to check you are happy and your lines are the right length – you may need to move, remove or rethink some words.

When you are happy, write out your poem neatly with a suitable title, your name and illustrations relating to the theme of your metaphors. Like last week, think carefully about how you want this to look – the space you will need for your writing and where you will place things on the page to be most effective. When you are happy with your finished piece – submit it to me.

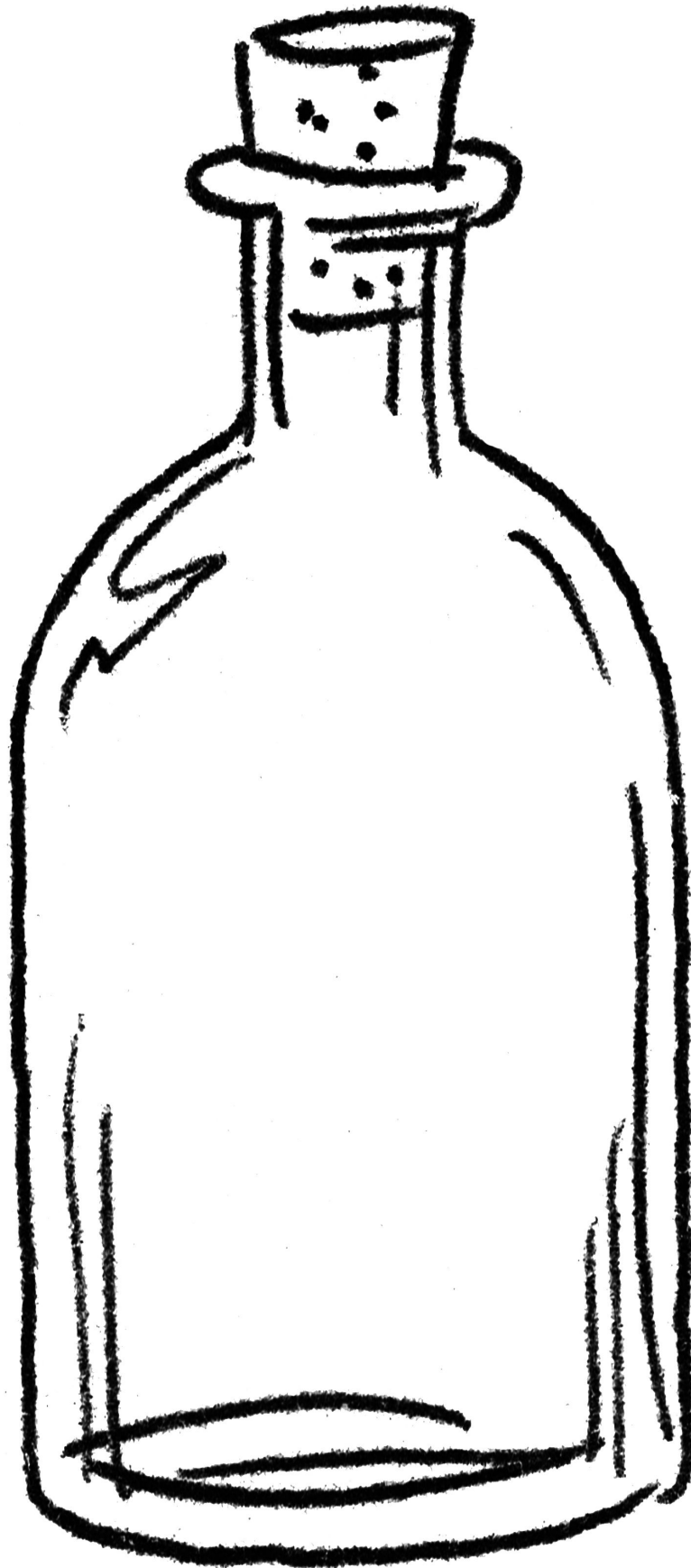

A World Full of Words

World Book Day
4th March 2021

C.S. Lewis wrote the magical and amazing 'The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe', you might have even seen the film. Even though you might not think there is a lot of maths in books - you'd be surprised! So let's investigate the words of Mr Lewis with a maths twist.

Have a look at this extract from
The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe:



Lucy felt a little frightened, but she felt very inquisitive and excited as well. She looked back over her shoulder and there, between the dark tree trunks; she could still see the open doorway of the wardrobe and even catch a glimpse of the empty room from which she had set out. (She had, of course, left the door open, for she knew that it is a very silly thing to shut oneself into a wardrobe.) It seemed to be still daylight there. "I can always get back if anything goes wrong," thought Lucy. She began to walk forward, crunch-crunch over the snow and through the wood towards the other light. In about ten minutes she reached it and found it was a lamp-post. As she stood looking at it, wondering why there was a lamp-post in the middle of a wood and wondering what to do next, she heard a pitter patter of feet coming towards her. And soon after that a very strange person stepped out from among the trees into the light of the lamp-post.

1. Investigate how many of each letter of the alphabet there is in the extract.
2. Choose your favourite part of your favourite book and do the same. Make sure the extract has 178 words 'to make your investigation fair and equal. What are the similarities/ differences? What are the most popular letters/ least popular letters.
3. Look into other details such as different types of punctuation and different word classes.

World Book Day 4th March 2021

World Book Day is an annual celebration of authors, illustrators, books and reading, which takes place in over 100 countries across the world.

Did you know, one of the best-selling books of all time is Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone: 107 million copies were sold. Plus, if you read for 30 minutes a day, in one year you will have seen way over a million words!



1. Guess the number of words in the first chapter.
2. If the peach doubles in size every 20 seconds, how much would it weigh after 2 minutes?
3. Estimate how long it would take to eat this giant peach.
4. If an average peach contains 165mg of potassium, how much potassium would be in this giant peach?
5. It takes 36 seconds for James to remove three of the centipede's boots. How long would it take for James to remove all the centipede's boots? Give your answer in minutes.

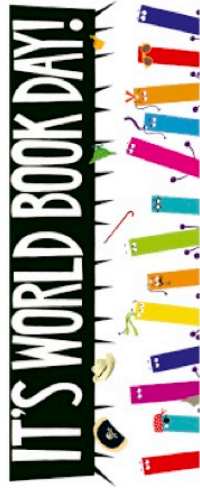


Can you guess the 'Masked Readers' – Watch the video on Class Story and guess which member of staff is which character!

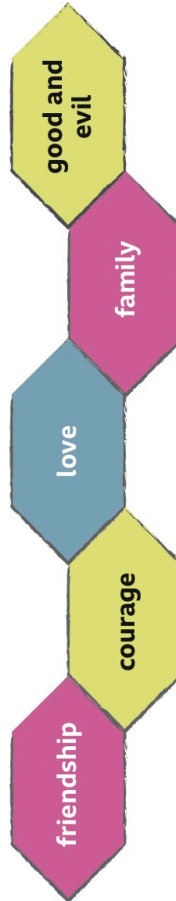

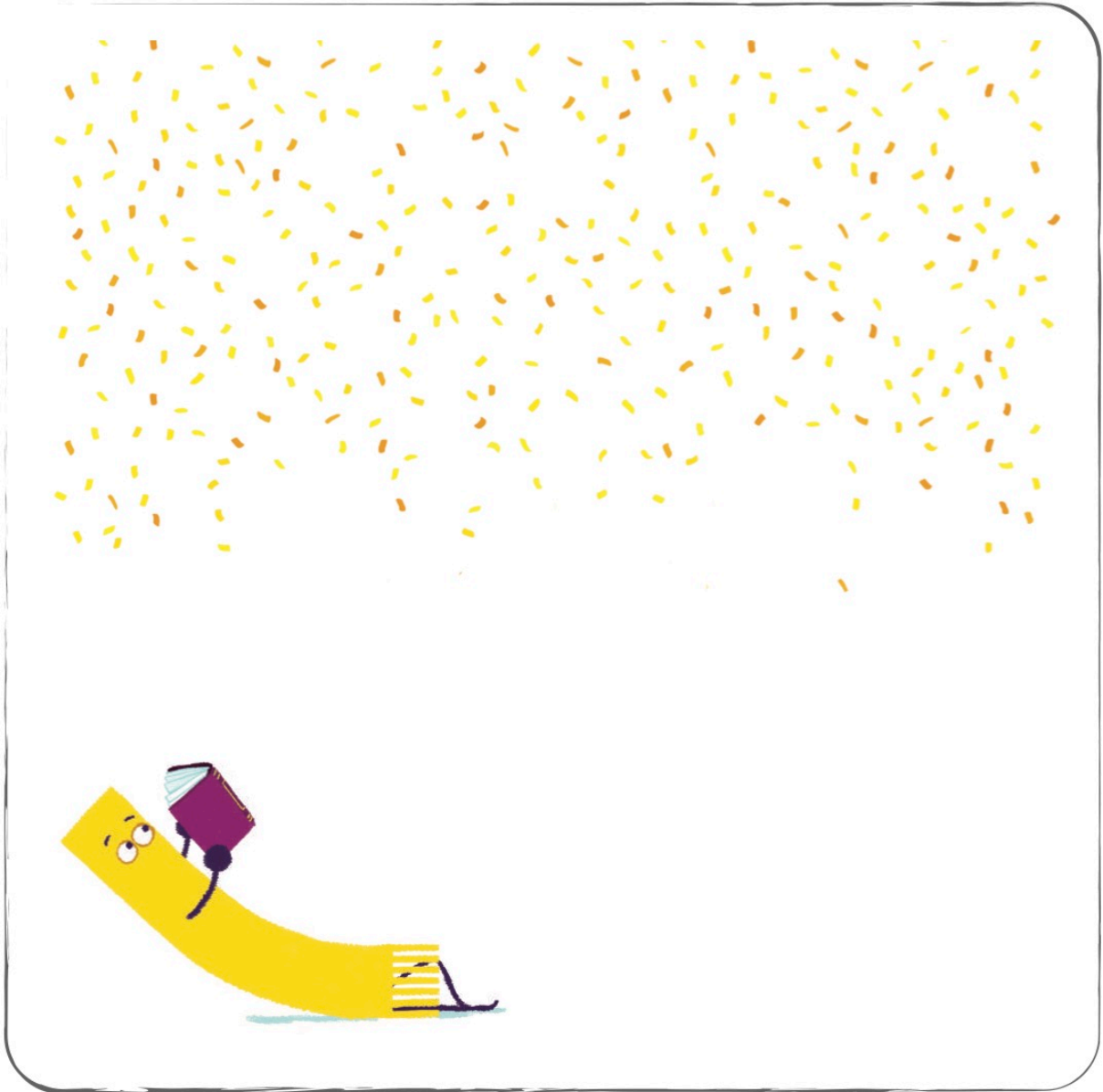
